16.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

a) Delineate the vision/plan of institution to transform itself into a holistic multidisciplinary institution.

The university is catering the multidisciplinary vision plan right from the conception itself. The University's goal is to blend science and spirituality in education. This can be achieved with the help of a multidisciplinary approach only. At present, none of the university's programs is single-disciplinary in nature. Students of any program must go through foundation courses like life management, yoga etc.

The basic school classification is as follows.

- 1. School of Technology, Communication and Management
- 2. School of Indology
- 3. School of Humanities, social sciences and foundation courses
- 4. school of Biological science

It can be easily visualized from these categorizations that the schools must integrate a multidisciplinary approach in channelizing subjective choice and electives for the students to attain the credits. For example, the School of Technology, Communication and Management own a multidisciplinary approach to subjects like Mathematics, Tourism, Journalism, Management and Animation.

The institution was established with the major thought process to develop a student into a comprehensive human being. Integrating this approach the students are getting multidisciplinary input from various sources which includes the holistic development of the individual to deal with day-to-day stress through Meditation and The Bhagwat Geeta, societal well-being through regular Yagya etc.

b) Delineate the Institutional approach towards the integration of humanities and science with STEM and provide the detail of programs with combinations.

In the Science segment, Computer science is integrating the engineering aspects like the Cloud, green, Internet of things. The upcoming MCA (Data Science) is clearly an inclusion of engineering aspects into the present curriculum. The Tourism department is already functioning with a program MBA (Tourism) which shows the integration of Management into the existing curriculum.

Under the Humanities segment, the Yogic Science curriculum emulates the science of Ayurveda, Basic science like Anatomy, and physiology so that students can be well versed both in Vedic knowledge and the scientific temperament of this unique subject. The Indian culture students are learning the basics of temple management, carbon dating and other archaeological aspects to add up a management perspective to their lifestyle. Along with the other single-disciplinary courses, students of humanities can choose to earn extra credits by enrolling themselves in elective courses related to Science, Technology, Engineering and mathematics.

c) Does the institution offer flexible and innovative curricula that includes credit-based courses and projects in the areas of community engagement and service, environmental education, and value-based towards the attainment of a holistic and multidisciplinary education. Explain

The entire university curriculum is based on the credits and the students are using their credit transfers in Erasmus + scholarship too while moving to European Universities for Semesters abroad. There are many projects aligned with the university department that are catering the Community engagement and service. The Unnat Bharat Abhiyan in which 5 villages had been adopted by the university. Environmental sensitivity is a key aspect of the university and it echoes the lush green environment, eco clubs and Taru Putra and Taru Mitra culture. The students are also actively involved in social

internships, and weekly village activities (By the Rural development department and Philosophy, dignity and theology department) so as to bring awareness in the villages regarding environmental sensitization. Human values and professional ethics are part of the curriculum of computer science students along with the practical orientation of human values is delivered to every student through Life Management programs throughout the year. Some of the facts are as under:

- Courses with Community engagement services: There are many courses in the institution like "Tour Reports", "Field visit reports" and "Social Internship Reports" are fully based on community engagement services.
- Courses with environmental education: About 82 courses in the institution are related to environmental education.
- Courses with multidisciplinary education: Two or more disciplines are blended into more than 40 courses in the institution in 2020-21.
- Courses on value based education: Value based education was integrated along with the discipline specific education into 135 courses in the institution in 2020-21.
- d) What is the institutional plan for offering a multidisciplinary flexible curriculum that enables multiple entry and exits at the end of 1st, 2nd and 3rd years of undergraduate education while maintaining the rigor of learning? Explain with examples.

The NEP guidelines as received from the Government of India will be implemented in the university from the next academic year 2022-23. A Team of senior members of the university along with the IQAC team is studying the various aspects, guidelines and implementation strategies through various available resources and is likely to get it in functionality next academic year.

e) What are the institutional plans to engage in more multidisciplinary research endeavours to find solutions to society's most pressing issues and challenges?

The university is highly engaged in providing solutions to society's most pressing issues and challenges. The various plans related to societal development are already implemented into the university curriculum, social corporate responsibilities and social internship etc. University research is no exception. The various Dissertations, Monographs and the PhD topics clearly indicate the commitment and deliverance of Dev Sanskriti University for this noble cause.

f) Describe any good practice/s of the institution to promote Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary approach in view of NEP 2020.

There are a number of Good Practices as mentioned below:

- 1. University provides opportunities to join multidisciplinary programs like MA/MSC in Yogic Science and Ayurveda, PGD in theology and psychological counselling and DCPIC (Diploma in Counselling and Psychotherapy in the Indian Context)

17. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The University has taken following initiatives to fulfil the requirements of ABC:

The University NAD cell is already functioning from 2019-20 onwards. The fresh guidelines of ABC is likely to receive us and based on the inputs from the UGC the university administration will ensure all the necessary segments in this context.

However, the Digitization of the academic records, Collaboration with other Indian and International Academic Institutions is continuously on. The induction of Technology and its usage at the university level is a continuous process and the university stakeholders are becoming more tech-savvy.

b) Whether the institution has registered under the ABC to permit its learners to avail the benefit of multiple entries and exit

during the chosen programme? Provide details.

It is yet to surfaced and clarified from the UGC and based on the inputs from the guidelines, it will be implemented on the university scale.

c) Describe the efforts of the institution for seamless collaboration, internationalization of education, joint degrees between Indian and foreign institutions, and to enable credit transfer.

The University is putting continuous efforts in shaping the international collaborations, internationalization of the education through University International Relations Department right from 2010 onwards.

The organization of various National and International conferences on the university level is bringing the scholars, leading academicians to the university and the departments are also enriching by their vast experiences in terms of deliverance to the students, international project writing, Joint research publications, international mentor programs etc. The IRO is continuous working on the knowledge-sharing, cooperation and communication among the international partners.

However, the exchange of the students, faculties is already in function under the Erasmus Plus collaborations. The Center for Baltic Culture and Studies is another segment where international students are reaching to the university under various tie-up with the Baltic nation's universities.

d) How faculties are encouraged to design their own curricular and pedagogical approaches within the approved framework, including textbook, reading material selections, assignments, and assessments etc.

The roadmap of curriculum designing is pretty straight forward. The curriculum Development committee of the department collects the formal and informal feedbacks, academic input from the various stakeholders and based on their respective inputs proposed a Course. It is put up on the board of studies platform with the external experts and later it had an approval from the Academic council and Board of Governors.

Moreover, the faculties are also encouraged to design their own curricular and pedagogical approaches within this approved

framework. The faculties had come up with some new set of textbooks, study material and assignments work based on the courses. The university is also helping the faculties to get publish their novelty work under the university publication department.

e) Describe any good practice/s of the institution pertaining to the implementation of Academic bank of credits (ABC) in the institution in view of NEP 2020.

Dedicated NAD Cell: The University started to offer all program's in choicecreditsystem(CBCS) from 2016 and italso has a dedicated NAD Cell.

18.Skill development:

a) Describe the efforts made by the institution to strengthen the vocational education and soft skills of students in alignment with National Skills Qualifications Framework

There are several efforts made by the university to strengthen the vocational education and soft skills of the students. They are as follows:

Career counselling: University provides career counselling and guidance to the students in order to help them in taking decisions about their future careers. This training that is provided through Career Guidance Center, includes guidance on vocational training opportunities and soft skills development courses that are aligned with the NSQF.

Soft skills development programs: The soft skill development program is an integral part of every student's curriculum and in addition to that, the University has a dedicated department of Career Support, Guidance and Placement (CSGP) that assists students to develop core competencies and soft skills.

Industry partnerships: The various industrial tie-ups, which aims to provide students with opportunities for internships, apprenticeships, and hands-on training, which can enhance their vocational education and develop their soft skills.

Industry Technical and Skill Certifications: University is also

helping the students in taking the Industrial technical programs to strengthen their knowledge and professional skills.

b) Provide the details of the programmes offered to promote vocational education and its integration into mainstream education.

- c) How the institution is providing Value-based education to inculcate positivity amongst the learner that include the development of humanistic, ethical, Constitutional, and universal human values of truth (satya), righteous conduct (dharma), peace (shanti), love (prem), nonviolence (ahimsa), scientific temper, citizenship values, and also life-skills etc.

The Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya was established with a vision to create noble and committed individuals and true patriots. The Kulpita Pt. Shriram Sharma Acharya, had a vision to establish a University devoted to the preservation and propagation of Indian Culture, which to him was Dev Sanskriti, that could combine the percepts of practical knowledge (shiksha) and spiritual education (vidya) to create truly enlightened individuals.

The vision of the Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is to unite contemporary education with spiritual training to cultivate well-rounded, competent and personally uplifted graduates, who possess a scientifically grounded understanding and experience of spiritual transformation and a powerful drive to use their gifts to promote the greater good of society.

To accomplish these objectives, the University has embraced a few unique traditions, such as 'Gyan Deeksha ceremony', which is conducted in the beginning of every academic session and through this Vedic ceremony, the students are encouraged to receive value-based knowledge and in return devote their time for the society.

There are two compulsory courses i.e., `Life Management' and 'Scientific Spirituality' for all the students of graduate and masters studies.

The Life Management syllabi covers all aspects related to life-skills and development of humanistic, ethical, inherent and universal human values of satya, dharma, shanti, prem, ahimsa, scientific temper and citizenship values. In addition, University also has a 'Shaurya Deewar' or 'Wall of Heroes', which showcases all the gallantry award winners of India and students daily sing National Anthem in front of it to convey their respect to the heroes as well as to develop a devotion to serve the nation with finest spirit.

- d) Enlist the institution's efforts to:
- i. Design a credit structure to ensure that all students take at least one vocational course before graduating.

It is mandatory for every undergraduate student to select at least one vocational course called `Skill Enhancement Course' or SEC. The SEC is practical in nature and is of 2 credits. The list of such courses is provided in the enclosure.

ii. Engaging the services of Industry veterans and Master Crafts persons to provide vocational skills and overcome gaps vis-à-vis trained faculty provisions.

The vocational training is provided by competent and trained teachers, some of whom are veterans. In special cases, such as with rug-making, apparel making and craftsmen work; services of veterans and master craftsmen are availed to deliver those course programmes.

iii. To offer vocational education in ODL/blended/on-campus modular modes to Learners.

The University is adequately equipped with workshops and laboratories to impart on- campus vocational education through experiential learning. The programme has a formal component for vocational learning which necessarily requires a blended learning module; for example - eNAM mandis, Dairy plant operation, Crop Husbandry practices, Travel and Tourism enterprises etc..

iv. NSDC association to facilitate all this by creating a unified platform to manage learner enrolment (students and workers), skill mapping, and certification.

The University is providing a supportive platform to the students through which the courses are proposed and offered that could manage learner's enrolment both students and workers, skill mapping and certification.

v. Skilling courses are planned to be offered to students through online and/or distance mode.

Skill development of the students is the primary key of all the courses which are offered on the university platform. The video modules of following courses have already been prepared and uploaded on the YouTube channel of University for the distance learning purposes.

- 3. Manufacturing of cow-based products
- 4. Scented sticks production

While designing these courses, effective Course design, inclusion of technology, effective support system, continuous assessment was considered to ensure their effective implementation:

e) Describe any good practice/s of the institution pertaining to the Skill development in view of NEP 2020.

The guidelines of NEP 2020 is yet to be received at our end. However, the good practices of the institution pertaining to the skill development are already in practice on the university level.

Emphasis on experiential learning: The University underlines experiential learning to enhance the skills of students. This involves hands-on learning and real-life experiences that enable students to apply their knowledge and skills to practical situations.

Integration of vocational education: University has integrated vocational education into the mainstream education system to provide students with a holistic learning experience. All students are encouraged to acquire skills through the compulsory Skill Enhancement Courses offered by the University. Besides, underprivileged students can also take advantage of a special scheme run by the University called 'Earn while Learn', which would allow

them to earn their livelihood via vocational skills.

Entrepreneurship Skills promotion: University promotes entrepreneurship and innovation by providing students with training and support to start their own businesses. University has also established a dedicated Innovation Cell that allows the start-up ideas of the students to grow. This has helped students to develop their skills in business management and promotes the growth of the economy.

Overall, the University has adopted a student-centric approach that focuses on enhancing the skills of students and prepares them for the future workforce.

Instutuional Values and Social Responsibilities

The University offers an exceptional learning- teaching process, distinctive ceremonies and also a mandatory social internship. Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya is committed to the preservation and propagation of the Indian Culture and the name Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya carries special significance as it stands for the values and practices inherited from the sublime conventions and ancestral wisdom of India.

The University works on a unique model of rural development which aims at developing self-reliant villages by transferring skills that are helpful for their livelihood. The University promotes and empowers all its students to equip themselves with appropriate skills that can sustain as valuable assets in their lives.

Institutional Distinctiveness

The University provides a helpful environment for human development along with professional and social development of its students as an essential component of their overall developmental process so as to induce the spirit of selfless service to society in them.

19. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

a) Delineate the strategy and details regarding the integration of the Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture etc,) into the curriculum using both offline and online courses. The name Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya carries special significance and stands for the values and practices inherited from the ancestral wisdom of India. The University is established with a primary aim of preservation and propagation of the Indian Culture, and hence, the University chose its name as Dev Sanskriti, to allow to combine the percepts of knowledge (shiksha) with spiritual education (vidya).

While the University most prizes the values and high-minded character traits of its student body, it also understands that a thorough and broad education in a field of specialization is a crucial resource for agents of change and social servants in the modern world. It is important to note that one of the four schools of the University is called 'School of Indology' which is created with a singular emphasis to offer courses in the Indian Knowledge System. This school has three faculties:

Faculty of Yoga and Health, Faculty of Indian Languages & Faculty of Indian Music and Culture are offering courses focusing upon Indian Knowledge Systems.

b) What are the institutions plans to train its faculties to provide the classroom delivery in bilingual mode (English and vernacular)? Provide the details.

There are various courses in English to the International Students that are developed to help them master Indian Knowledge Systems. The courses are functioning under the International Relation Department and the faculties are well-trained to deliver these programmes and University proudly offers bilingual teaching to its students. A list of abovementioned courses is enclosed.

Indian languages (Sanskrit, Pali, Prakrit and classical, tribal and endangered etc.)

The DSVV is making some serious efforts in order to preserve and promote the indigenous knowledge system of India which includes

languages, Indian knowledge system etc.

Preservation of Communication in Indian Languages: The University offers Sanskrit Communication Workshop to all students and has conducted exclusive workshops in Vedic Mantra recitation and related areas.

In addition, the University offers Sanskrit Communication Workshop to all students and has conducted exclusive workshops in Vedic Mantra recitation and related areas. University is also the proud host of Valley of Words Writer Awards that are offered to prominent writers in Hindi and Sanskrit languages.

Indian ancient traditional knowledge

The University has digitized the books of the founder-patron of India on ancient traditional knowledge of India, which could be accessed by people worldwide. The faculties of University have worked in publications of Durlabh Upanishads to classical scriptures, such as Yoga Vasishta.

The University has also established a unique 'Yagyavalkya Center for Yagya Research' to preserve the sacred tradition of Yagya and to conduct high quality research in this field.

Indian Arts & Indian Culture and traditions

The University has a committed division of 'Sanskritik Prakosth' that works on preservation, propagation and presentation of Indian arts, music, dance, folk songs etc. It has received National awards on several occasions. This division also works with Spic McKay to host various artists of traditional Indian heritage systems, who regularly perform in University.

The University has a 'sanskar prakostha' to preserve Indian culture and traditions that conducts Vedic ceremonies for all students ranging from their birthdays to deep yagya rituals that are uniquely conducted by students.

In addition, the University also offers 'Bharatiya Sanskriti Gyan Pariksha' with so-named cell of parent organisation. This is an examination developed to offer a fundamental understanding of Indian Culture to each and every student of India.

- e) Describe any good practice/s of the institution pertaining to the appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course) in view of NEP 2020.
 - 1. Daily routine based on Indian Culture:

The daily routine of the University isfashioned on the ethos of the Indian Culture and includes participation of studentsandstaffindaily yagya, yoga, Indianclassical music, Naad Yoga Meditation, sevakarya and morning and evening prarthanas in the hostel.

2. Establishment of School of Indology:

One of the four schools of the University iscalled School of Indology' which apart from being the largest school of University, is also the one that was created with a singular emphasist of fercourses in the Indian Knowledge System. This school has three faculties.

- 3. Capacity building: University provides training and capacity building programs for teachers and educators to enhance their understanding of traditional knowledge systems and practices.
- 4. Collaborative efforts: University collaborates with indigenous communities, scholars, and experts to promote and integrate traditional knowledge systems into mainstream education.

20. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

i. Describe the institutional initiatives to transform its curriculum towards Outcome based Education (OBE)?

The University has used an approach that focuses on identifying the desired outcomes or competencies that students should possess upon graduation, and then it designs the curriculum that ensures that those outcomes are achieved. Based on this approach, University developed a roadmap for implementation of outcome-based education during a course feedback meeting in June 2019 and this roadmap was then critically discussed with the academic administrators, teachers and planners. This road map included significant initiatives such as defining learning outcomes for each program or course, mapping learning outcomes to curriculum, assessing student learning, and aligning faculty development and resources.

ii. Explain the efforts made by the institution to capture the Outcome based education in teaching and learning practices.

Several workshops were conducted round the year with departments to elaborate POs, PEOs, COs and evaluation strategy for the courses offered in DSVV.

Departments prepared outcome-based curriculum, devised teaching strategies and identified activities to fulfil requisite outcomes as per the guideline documents developed by the University. The outcome-based syllabus was implemented in the university from the Academic session 2019-20 onwards

The OBE was implemented in the university from 2019-20 academic sessions and the following good practices are already in the process..

- Defining clear learning outcomes: University defined learning outcomes clearly and precisely. Learning outcomes are aligned with the program objectives and NEP 2020 guidelines. The outcomes are specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound.

- Faculty development: University provides training and professional development opportunities to faculty members to implement OBE effectively. Faculty members are trained on designing and delivering competency-based instruction, developing assessment tools, and providing feedback. In order to improve teachers'
- Continuous feedback and improvement: University uses continuous feedback to students on their performance and progress towards achieving the learning outcomes. The feedback are also used to improve teaching and learning strategies and to update the curriculum.

Yes. The University has a total land area of 73.15 Acres, and as of now total built up area is 84226.84 sqm which hosts 21 departments in 9 faculty of 4 Schools with adequate number of class rooms,

seminar halls, tutorial rooms, laboratories, and suitable space for hosting all academic activities (both curricular and co-curricular types.).

The University has planned and constructed the infrastructure which facilitates the current as well as the ever increasing requirements as per its future plans. As of now total 33 Lecture hall, 11 Laboratories, 3 Seminar halls, one large auditorium (having capacity of 1500 persons) and one small auditorium (having capacity of 250 persons). Both auditoriums have almost all modern day facilities including comfortable seating, proportionate sized stage, etc.

All essential equipments for conducting various experiments as per the requirements of all courses are available. Ample computing facility which includes above 500 high configuration desktops, High end servers, high speed switches etc. available. Wired as well as wireless connectivity to Internet is available almost in each corner of the university including hostels. The SOPHOS hardware firewall managed switches are used to provide robust security to the computing facilities.

The Central Library of DSVV is working on Library Management Software SOUL 2.0 from 2013. The library is fully integrated with RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) Technology where users can enter, search catalogue, borrow and return books that can be done on his own.

Acquisition of books is processed through SOUL software by entering the required data like budget, approvals, processing of invoices and other related to acquisition is done at technical section. RFID tag & Barcode pasting is also done here.

Circulation Section is placed in front of textbook section equipped with one computer terminals for transactions, One Issue Kiosk for issue & return books.

Users without issuing a book pass through the RFID gate an Indicator will be generated to alert the library staff & guard. RFID gates are placed near the entrance of the library.

Periodicals processing are done through the SOUL software. Subscriptions, renewals, missing issues, communication with vendors etc. are done at the periodical section.

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The institution has adequate facilities for teaching - learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Yes. The University has a total land area of 73.15 Acres, and as of now total built up area is 84226.84 sqm which hosts 21 departments in 9 faculty of 4 Schools with adequate number of class rooms, seminar halls, tutorial rooms, laboratories, and suitable space for hosting all academic activities (both curricular and co-curricular types.).

The University has planned and constructed the infrastructure which facilitates the current as well as the ever increasing requirements as per its future plans. As of now total 33 Lecture hall, 11 Laboratories, 3 Seminar halls, one large auditorium (having capacity of 1500 persons) and one small auditorium (having capacity of 250 persons). Both auditoriums have almost all modern day facilities including comfortable seating, proportionate sized stage, etc.

All essential equipments for conducting various experiments as per the requirements of all courses are available. Ample computing facility which includes above 500 high configuration desktops, High end servers, high speed switches etc. available. Wired as well as wireless connectivity to Internet is available almost in each corner of the university including hostels. The SOPHOS hardware firewall managed switches are used to provide robust security to the computing facilities.

Acquisition of books is processed through SOUL software by entering the required data like budget, approvals, processing of invoices and other related to acquisition is done at technical section. RFID tag & Barcode pasting is also done here.

Circulation Section is placed in front of textbook section equipped with one computer terminals for transactions, One Issue Kiosk for issue & return books.

Users without issuing a book pass through the RFID gate an Indicator will be generated to alert the library staff & guard. RFID gates are placed near the entrance of the library.

Periodicals processing are done through the SOUL software. Subscriptions, renewals, missing issues, communication with vendors etc. are done at the periodical section.
